

MARCH MISSION GIVING FOCUS: UMCOR

This month we turn our hearts and hands toward one of The United Methodist Church's most trusted and impactful mission partners: the United Methodist Committee on Relief, known widely as UMCOR. At its core, UMCOR answers Jesus' call to love our neighbors and bear one another's burdens by bringing help and hope where suffering is greatest.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief is the global humanitarian relief and development organization of The United Methodist Church. UMCOR serves as the Church's principal response to human suffering around the world—whether caused by natural disasters, war and conflict, famine, or other overwhelming crises. It is a nonprofit ministry operating under the General Board of Global Ministries and engages in relief efforts in more than 70 countries, including here in the United States.

One defining strength of UMCOR is that 100% of every dollar designated for a specific disaster or relief project goes directly to that work—not to administrative costs. That's because the "costs of doing business" for UMCOR are funded through a separate annual offering that underwrites administrative expenses so gifts to specific projects can go entirely to those in need. Here are the kinds of work your giving supports:

- **Immediate Disaster Relief** - When hurricanes, floods, earthquakes, wildfires or other disasters strike, UMCOR mobilizes quickly to provide essentials like food, clean water, temporary shelter, hygiene items, and debris removal to overwhelmed communities.
- **Long-Term Recovery and Reconstruction** - UMCOR doesn't only respond in the first days after a crisis. It also helps families and communities rebuild their lives—from repairing homes and restoring livelihoods to case management and ongoing support for recovery.
- **Global Health, Hunger, and Poverty Initiatives** - In partnership with local organizations around the world, UMCOR addresses hunger, poverty, disease, and lack of access to clean water or healthcare—seeking sustainable solutions to complex, long-term needs.
- **Refugee and Migration Support** - UMCOR ministers to displaced people, refugees, and migrants by partnering with agencies to provide essential services, shelter, and welcoming care wherever displacement has occurred.

Because of this wide ministry impact, giving to UMCOR is not only a response to crisis—it is a faithful testament to our shared call to live out Christ's love in tangible, life-changing ways. When we give to UMCOR this month, we extend help, hope and healing to our neighbors near and far.

THINK ABOUT IT: FORMED TOGETHER

The earliest followers of Jesus did not grow in isolation. Acts tells us they devoted themselves to teaching, fellowship, breaking bread, and prayer. They shared what they had. They worshiped together. They learned together. They carried one another's burdens. And something remarkable happened: grace became visible. Hebrews adds another layer: "Let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together... but encouraging one another."

From the very beginning, Christian faith has never been private. Grace forms us most deeply in community. Small gatherings in homes, around tables, in classrooms, or in circles of prayer have always been central to Methodist renewal. John Wesley understood that transformation happens best when people know one another well enough to encourage, challenge, and support one another in love. *We do not grow alone.*

Questions to Think About This Week

1. Who currently knows the real state of my soul — my fears, my hopes, my struggles, my questions?
2. Do I approach church primarily as a place I attend, or as a community I belong to?
3. What practices (prayer, Scripture, conversation, shared service) help me grow when I engage them with others?
4. Is there a place in my life where isolation has slowly replaced connection?
5. Where might God be inviting me into deeper, more honest community?

Action Steps - Renewal spreads through shared practice. Community deepens when participation becomes intentional.

- *Reach Out Intentionally.* Contact one person this week simply to check in — not to fix, not to advise, but to listen.
- *Practice Shared Prayer.* Invite someone to pray with you — in person or over the phone. Even a brief prayer can deepen connection.
- *Show Up.* If you are part of a small group, attend intentionally this week. If you are not, consider taking one step toward joining one.
- *Encourage Actively.* Offer a specific word of encouragement to someone whose faith you admire.

Prayer for the Week

Faithful God, you gather us into community. You call us not only to believe, but to belong. Form us through shared prayer and honest conversation. Give us courage to be known and grace to know others well. Teach us to encourage one another toward love and good deeds. Where isolation has taken root, plant connection. Where hesitation has kept us distant, draw us closer. Make our shared life a witness to your renewing love. Through Christ our Lord, AMEN.

Final Thought

The early church did not grow because individuals became spiritually impressive. It grew because grace shaped a community. As we continue this Lenten journey, remember: faith matures in fellowship. Love becomes visible when shared. Renewal takes root when we walk together. Let grace form us — together.
