THINK ABOUT IT THIS WEEK: WHAT DOES GOD REALLY WANT?
What does God want from us? People have asked that question for centuries, and Micah’s audience was no exception. They wondered whether God wanted increasingly extravagant religious offerings: burnt offerings, thousands of rams, or rivers of oil. Beneath their questions was an assumption many of us still carry—that if we say the right prayers, give enough, or perform our religion correctly, we might earn God’s approval.

Micah cuts through all of it: “*God has told you, O mortal, what is good.*” God’s desire is not mysterious. We are called to do justice, love steadfastly, and walk humbly with God.

These words do not mean that worship, prayer, or generosity are unimportant. They mean our religious practices cannot be separated from the way we live. Worship becomes hollow when we praise God on Sunday but ignore injustice on Monday. Prayer becomes incomplete when we ask God to help our neighbors but refuse to participate in that help. Faithfulness is not measured by what happens inside the church; it is revealed in how we use our influence, treat other people, respond to suffering, and move through the world.

To *do justice* is more than believing in fairness. It means helping to repair what is wrong and changing conditions that cause harm.

To *love steadfastly* is more than occasionally being kind. It means making mercy, loyalty, and compassion part of who we are.

To *walk humbly* with God is to recognize that we do not possess all the truth, control every outcome, or travel alone. We remain teachable, depend upon grace, and allow God to guide our next faithful step.

- QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER
- Is there a difference between practicing religion and living faithfully? Where do you see that distinction in your own life?
 - Where do you see injustice that has become so familiar that people have stopped noticing or questioning it?
 - Is mercy something you offer freely, or mainly when you believe someone deserves it?
 - What would it mean for you to walk more humbly with God this week—to listen more carefully, release some control, admit you may be wrong, or remain open to change?

- WAYS TO LIVE IT OUT
- Speak when someone is being dismissed, support an organization addressing a harmful condition, or use your influence to make a space fairer and safer.
 - Extend patience, compassion, or mercy in a relationship where irritation or resentment has begun shaping your response.
 - Enter one conversation determined to learn rather than win. Ask a sincere question and listen without preparing your defense.
 - Consider one prayer, hymn, or Scripture from Sunday and ask how it should become visible in your choices during the week.

PRAYER FOR THE WEEK
Gracious God, you have already shown us what is good. Free us from the need to impress you and from the temptation to substitute religious words for faithful living. By your grace, give us courage to do justice, hearts that delight in steadfast love, and humility to walk beside you without pretending that we know everything or can do everything alone. Help us co-operate with the Holy Spirit so that our worship becomes compassion, our prayers become action, and our lives reflect your love. Amen.

CLOSING THOUGHT
God does not ask us to perform our faith perfectly. God invites us to embody the grace we have already received—by doing justice, loving steadfastly, and walking humbly, one faithful step at a time.
